WHY?

The Chardon Board of Education is intent on finding added ways to increase revenue of the school district.

The school district owes it to our taxpayers to explore all means of funding available.



A Legacy of Pride... A Future of Promise

- Open enrollment is a policy which allows students who are residents of other school districts to attend the Chardon Local Schools
- This policy would generate additional revenue for the school district

Guidelines would be established by the Chardon Board of Education

A Legacy of Pride... A Future of Promise

- 78 % of Ohio schools have open enrollment
- Chardon and Kenston are the only two Geauga
 Co. districts that do not offer open enrollment

A Legacy of Pride... A Future of Promise

- We have the equivalent of 25 Chardon students currently attending schools outside of our district.
- Money from Chardon taxpayers follows these students to the district they attend.
- This means approx. \$5,700 per student leaves Chardon Schools

\$5,700 X 25 = \$142,500 in lost revenue

\$5,700

Total amount that leaves the district with the student

-<u>\$1,732</u>

Avg. State Revenue Per Pupil (2011-12 year)

= \$3,968

Amount of Chardon taxpayer dollars per pupil that follows the student



A Legacy of Pride... A Future of Promise

- Per our employee negotiated agreement, the children of employees who live outside the district can attend Chardon Schools.
- Without open enrollment, money from their home school district does not follow these students to Chardon Schools.



A Legacy of Pride... A Future of Promise

- 12 Chardon students are children of employees who live outside the district.
- Currently we receive no additional money for these students.
- **12** X \$5,700 = \$68,400

With open enrollment we would collect an additional \$68,400



- The equivalent of 54 Chardon students are currently being educated via online academies or charter schools.
- The total cost to the district is \$374,804.
- Chardon does not receive any state funds for these students.

Once again, the Chardon taxpayer's monies are leaving our district.

\$374,804 Total cost for online academies and charter schools

- <u>\$93,528</u>

Amount Chardon would receive if these students attended Chardon (\$1,732 X 54 = \$93,528)

= \$281,276 Amount of Chardon taxpayer dollars leaving the district



A Legacy of Pride... A Future of Promise

- Open enrollment would be based on space availability in a particular grade or school building.
- Open enrollment guidelines would need to be met before approval was granted
- An open enrollment application alone would not mean automatic approval



A Legacy of Pride... A Future of Promise

- If a student is accepted, the parent provides transportation
- Enrollment will be analyzed annually to determine classroom availability. Which means the transfer student would need to apply annually.
- For every student accepted, the District would receive approx. \$5,700 per year

The open enrollment policy would be reviewed annually to determine its effectiveness



Do we have space?

Historical data shows that the 2005-2006 school year was our peak for student enrollment. Since that school year our numbers have been on a steady decline.

 The Capacity Analysis report that was conducted in 2009, projects our enrollment will continue to be on a downward trend.

Enrollment Projections

At our March Board Meeting we should be able to identify which areas where we can accept students from other districts.

By then Kindergarten registration will be concluded and we will have a better picture for the next school year.



A Legacy of Pride... A Future of Promise

Because Chardon Schools is on a "Guarantee" program, we do not receive any additional funds if a student moves into our district.

BUT.....

With Open Enrollment

We can receive additional funds for every student from outside our district that transfers to our schools
